

POVERTY SIMULATION

PROGRAM IMPACT REPORT

On February 16, 2015, Kenosha County UW-Extension partnered with the United Way of Kenosha County to conduct a Poverty Simulation at Wheatland Center School. A total of 60 participants and 24 volunteers from Wheatland Center School and Lakewood Elementary School engaged in the 3-hour activity, which is designed to increase understanding of some of the challenges that low-income individuals and families face on a daily basis.

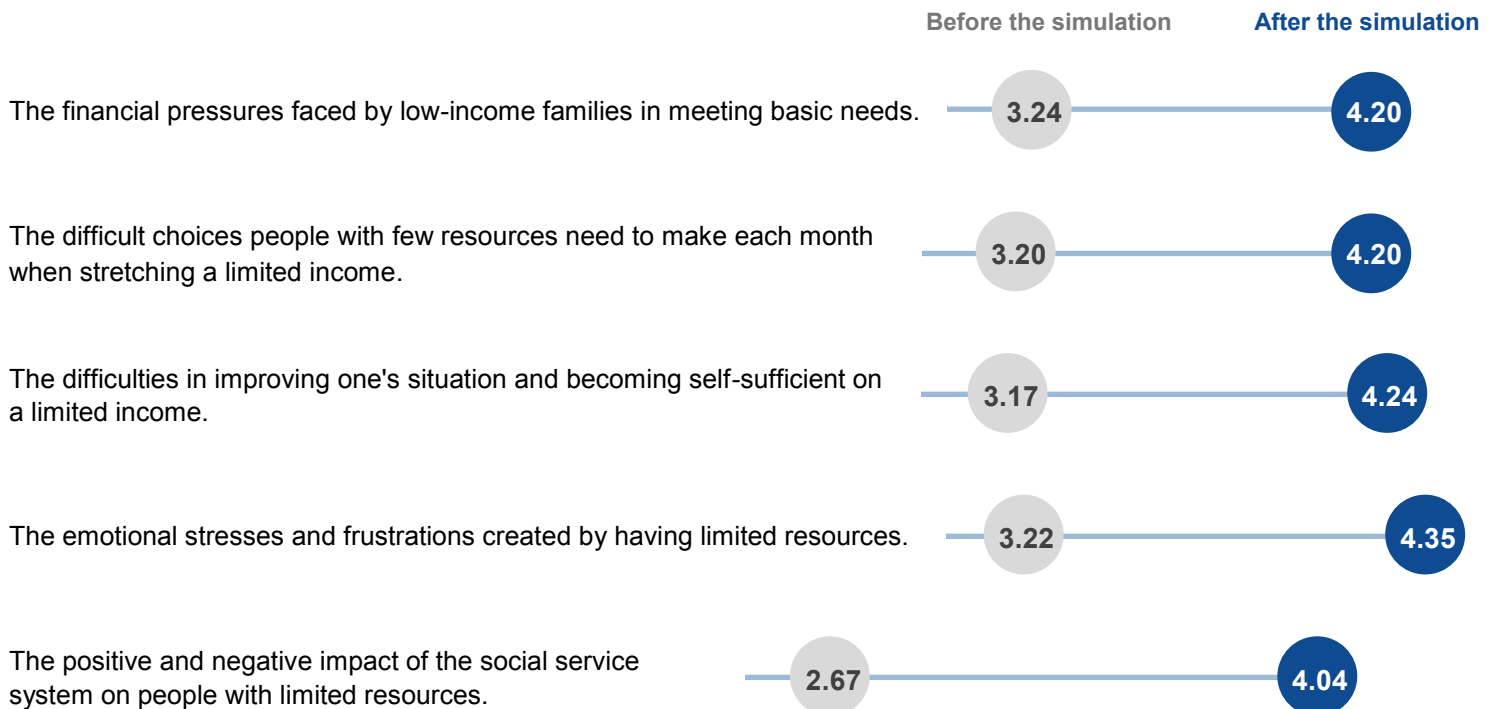
